C.W. Anderson

C.W. Anderson began his ministry as a student local pastor at McMillan in the Texas Conference. He became a member of the North Texas Conference in 1983 and was appointed to Warren United Methodist Church for three years. He then was appointed to Clarksville/St. Paul until his retirement in 2011. Rev. Anderson passed away on December 17, 2011 and services were held December 21, 2011 at McMillan UMC, Fort Worth, TX.

Douglas Ewing Jackson

Rev. Dr. Douglas Ewing Jackson born July 4, 1919 was the first of his Kentucky family to attend high school. Encouraged by his parents always to learn as much as he could, he read every book in the public library and graduated high school. An avid, brilliant student affected by the Great Depression, nevertheless he was able through benevolence of the Methodist Church to attend college. He earned four degrees: magna cum laude BA from Asbury College, B. Div. with distinction from Garrett Theological Seminary, MA and PhD from Northwestern University. As a child Dr. Jackson constantly studied the Bible with his deeply religious parents, early leaders in recognizing racial equality: all God's children are to be respected and valued. So they went to every church in town, walking everywhere

without reprisal because of the respect afforded them. Dr. Jackson committed his life to Christ at 11 and preached his first sermon at 13, wearing a white linen suit made by his mother. Dr. Jackson and his new bride, Thella, held a number of pastorates in the Methodist Church in Indiana and Chicago while pursuing his graduate studies, and continued his ministerial career through the North Texas Conference and through Sunday school teaching at Highland Park UMC.

Dr. Jackson's academic teaching was ministry as well, using his gifts, knowledge and wisdom to pass on to his students the tenets of faithful living, social justice, and care for all God's children. He had never forgotten the horror of a lynching he had witnessed by the Ku Klux Klan early in his life. He taught at Emory University, 1948–1954, then at Perkins School of Theology at SMU, 1954–1985. He centered on how the Church at large and individuals as faithful disciples must relate to the world in its constantly changing environment. He taught eager black students informally and the first black seminarians at Perkins. He instructed cadets at the Dallas Police Academy, debated racial questions with John Birchers, and was at the forefront of recognizing the addictiveness rather than sinfulness of alcoholism. Dr. Jackson was legendary for conducting classes humbly, simply sharing the vast knowledge he had without any sign of ego and not using notes at all to prompt his memory. Those qualities brought him the Distinguished Faculty Award from the SMU Alumni Association and the M award from the student body. An avid basketball fan who held SMU season tickets, his greatest joy was sharing the games with family, especially his great-grandchildren.

Kathryn Mackenzie

Kathryn and Ken Mackenzie were married in 1942 in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Within three months, Ken became First Lieutenant Mackenzie in World War II. Upon his return, Kathryn and Ken had four children. They were relocated to Paris, Texas in 1968 when "Katy" enrolled in the Course of Study School at Perkins School of Theology at SMU. Katy became part of the North Texas Conference in





1981 and served at Dike until its closure in 1983. In 1986 she was ordained as a deacon and served at Enloe from 1983 until her retirement in 1987.

James B. Palmer, Sr.

Jim earned degrees from Grove City College, Garrett Theological Seminary, and Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University. In his over 63 years of ministry he pastored 18 different congregations, including 4 years as Pastor of the English Speaking Church in La Paz Bolivia at the Institute Americana de La Paz. He authored three books: <u>Red Poncho and Big Boots</u>, <u>Prayer for the Day</u>, July Gospel Jubilee, and co-authored Journey to Dignity with Bishop Eugenio Poma. The Pomas have been considered a part of the Palmer family since the beginning of Jim's ministry in Bolivia.

Jim was a Chaplain with the McKinney Medical Center, Presbyterian Hospital of Allen, The Allen Police Department, McKinney Animal

Hospital, and an Associate Chaplain with the McKinney Police and Fire Department. When not serving people in ministry, Jim could be found on the golf course, usually searching for lost golf balls that he would later offer for sale on an "honorary basis". Proceeds from the golf ball sales supported the children at Grace Children's Hospital. He enjoyed classical music, playing the organ, and hunting. He was a very good shot and was very proud of his concealed carry permit.

Jim will also be remembered by many for his tenacious faithfulness to God by arriving at the church or ministry event well in advance of the starting time. The absence of his early morning schedule leaves many with the question, "Who will let God into church in the morning now?"

Elwood Spencer Poore

Woody was born in Haverhill, MA on February 12, 1922 to Edwin and Lucy Brown Poore. He graduated from Cornell College and then from Bangor Theological Seminary. He married Ruth Grace Webster on September 3, 1948. He served churches in Maine, Iowa, and Texas. He graduated with advanced degrees in Music History and Sacred Music from SMU.

Woody was Pastor Emeritus at First United Methodist Church, Gainesville, Texas. In his retirement he also served as chaplain at Lake Kiowa. His service in ministry spanned over 60 years, touching the lives of hundreds of families.

Woody enjoyed people, collecting stamps, and postcards and music. He was a 32nd Degree Mason, Lion's Club member, veteran (Army Signal Corps), teacher, community volunteer and life-long student.





Edgar James Bell

Edgar James Bell was born in Akron, Ohio on September 28, 1939 to Edgar and Alberta Welch Bell. Jim graduated from high school in 1957 in Akron and joined the Air Force in 1958. He served for 20 years active duty, including a tour in Germany 1962-1965, and service in Vietnam, 1968–1969. In 1971, he earned the rating of master instructor on aircraft electrical systems. He retired from the Air Force in 1978 and worked for Northup World Wide Aircraft Services and Dyna Corps in Wichita Falls for 12 years.

In 1987 Jim entered the ministry and was appointed as a local Methodist pastor in Wichita Falls. He served as pastor of Friberg-Cooper UMC for 16 years and at Bryson-Perrin UMC for a total of four years. With a strong desire to help others, Jim was compelled to serve his country and community as a volunteer in many activities. A few include the CONCERN Helpline, and volunteer driver (logging over 800 hours) taking veterans to the VA Hospital in Oklahoma City.

Allie Aikin

Allie Aikin was born August 26, 1919 in Annona, Texas to Charles Robert and Clara Cherry Holloway. Allie, a resident of Clarksville, was a homemaker, a great cook, loved her family, gardening and taking care of others. She was preceded in death by her husband, Rev. L. J. Aikin.

Lucille Greenhaw

Lucille Greenhaw, a preacher's wife for 70 years, was born October 28, 1917 in Denison, TX and passed away on January 14, 2012. She was preceded in death by her husband Rev. William Greenhaw. She is survived by 2 daughters and sons-in-law, 8 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren. Services were held on January 19, 2012 at St. Philip's UMC in Garland, TX.



Hazel Johnson

Hazel was born in Hopkins County on December 15, 1923 to William M. Weir and Addie Mae Herman Weir and passed away on September 8, 2011. She married Marion F. "Johnny" Johnson on September 24, 1960, who preceded her in death in 1997. Hazel was the oldest of four siblings and the ring leader of all the escapades and fun. Hazel and Johnny especially ministered to young families. It was not unusual for a young adult, with small children of their own, to come up to her when visiting churches she had previously served with Johnny. It was a good Christian adult raising his or her own children to love the Lord. She was also very involved in all the craft making and organization for Lord's Acres and



other fundraising events. You could always count on Hazel to sew and make whatever was popular at the time to feature and sell at fundraisers. "Red" as she was referred to by family members often hosted family gatherings of up to 45 family members at their home. Her love for God showed through everything she did.

Lucille Leffel

Lucille was born on September 6, 1916 to Henry Cirgus Minter and Anna Harned Minter of Louisville, Kentucky and passed away August 29, 2011 at the age of 94. Lucille and Robert Leffel, Jr. were married June 4, 1938. Her husband served in the U.S. Air Force and Army during World War II. Lucille was a pastor's wife in east Texas in the 1950's. When her husband returned to the military as an Air Force Chaplain, Lucille supported him by taking care of their family when he was away for extended periods of times and went with him when he was stationed in Japan. Lucille and Robert served churches in the Wichita Falls area of the North Texas Conference after his retirement from the Air Force. She devoted her life to her husband, children and the Methodist church, where she taught classes and played the piano when needed. The Leffels have two sons.

Harriet McGee

Harriet was born in Morrisville, Missouri on July 16, 1921 to Lanta Mae Gulick Winton and James Fielding Winton. She graduated from Central College, Fayette, Missouri with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1942, and received a Master of Arts degree in English from the University of Missouri, Columbia, in 1947. Harriet was a homemaker for many years and an English teacher in the Dallas Independent School District for 15 years. She also was a gifted pianist and soprano and sang with the Dallas Symphony Chorus. Harriet was married for over sixty years to Rev. John W. (Jack) McGee, who died in 2007. Together, they served for over thirty years in the North Texas Conference of The United Methodist Church. Over the years, Harriet served the congregations' music



programs as organist, choir director, and frequent soloist on Sunday mornings. For the last seventeen years, Harriet has resided in Atlanta.

Ida Louise Noblin

Ida Louise Alford was born in the Methodist parsonage at Saucier, Mississippi, February 20, 1916 the youngest of five children. She grew up in various parsonages in Mississippi, enrolling at Whitworth College in the fall of 1933. Graduating two years later with an award in Religious Studies, she went to Millsaps College in Jackson, Mississippi, finishing in 1937. She spent the next nine months working for the Mississippi Children's Home Society, an agency placing children in adoptive homes. After three months of teaching in Laurel, Mississippi, she married James Swope Noblin, a Methodist minister, August 28, 1938. To them were born five sons, four of whom survive her. She earned a Masters Degree from the University of Southern Mississippi in 1957. In June 1957 the



family moved to Dallas, Texas where her husband attended Perkins School of Theology at SMU, graduating in 1960. He served at several pastorates including White Rock UMC and Lovers Lane UMC. Ida Louise taught in the Dallas Independent School District for 23 years, retiring in 1980. Later she served as a chaplain at Parkland Hospital for four years and as oncology, gerontology and hospice chaplain at Riverside Methodist Hospital in Columbus Ohio until retiring in 1986 when she returned to Dallas.

Annette Echols Palmer

Ann was born March 4, 1959 in Beverly, MA and grew up in Virginia, Ohio, and finally arrived in Texas in 1976. She graduated from Texas A&M University with a Bachelor of Science degree in 1981. She was working on a Master of Arts in Teaching in Science Education at the University of Texas at Dallas when she passed away.

Margaret "Peggy" Railey


