Preventing Sexual Abuse: 5-Part Safety System

I. SEXUAL ABUSE AWARENESS TRAINING

*foundational piece of an educational model
*gives employees and volunteers 'eyes to see and ears to hear' grooming behaviors
*policies and procedures will have limited impact without the "why"
*explains safety principles behind policies
*compliant with current and anticipated legislation (i.e. Texas Youth Camp Act)

II. SKILLFUL SCREENING TRAINING

*intensive, yet critical piece of the system
*trains screeners to properly use forms and process created to elicit high-risk responses
*trains screeners to recognize high risk behaviors and life patterns
*dove-tails with Awareness Training, Background Check and Monitoring

III. APPROPRIATE CRIMINAL BACKGROUND CHECK

*necessary, though no stand-alone piece of safety system (not a "silver bullet") *depth of background check should match degree and structure of access to children

IV. TAILORED POLICIES & PROCEDURES

*"policies are what you DO ... not what you SAY you do"
*tailored to specific programming – no "one-size-fits-all" forms
*policies are marginally effective without Awareness Training
*beyond the basics: includes bathroom checks, six-month member rule etc.

V. MONITORING AND OVERSIGHT

*ensuring that you DO what you SAY you do *periodic review of the system: new programming, performance reviews, accountability *monitoring tools

FACTS ABOUT SEXUAL ABUSE AND SEXUAL ABUSERS

Question 1: what <u>system</u> is in place at my church to protect children? **Question 2:** does that system account for the following facts?

*Sexual Molesters will seek access to children where protective barriers are low.

-Understanding this, secular entities are implementing training and other measures.

-The protective barriers in the Church are already critically low ... already a target.

-The Church's continued failure to respond makes the Church a larger target.

*Only 10% of sexual predators will EVER encounter the criminal justice system.

-As a result, your criminal background check – even if it works perfectly – will only identify a *fraction* of those who want to abuse children in your programs.
-Sexual abusers KNOW when there is nothing for you to find – even if you run a check.
-Background checks are important, but have limitations: NOT A SILVER BULLET!
-If a background check is ALL we do, our security blanket is the size of a place mat.

*1 of 3 girls and 1 of 6 boys will be sexually molested before reaching age 18. THIS IS AN ISSUE OF EPIDEMIC PROPORTION ... AND IS GROWING.

*66% of molestation victims will not tell until adulthood (if ever).

*Male molesters preferring boys will have an <u>average of 150 victims</u> before prosecution. *Male molesters preferring girls will have an <u>average of 52 victims</u> before prosecution. *85% of convicted molesters are men; 15% of convicted molesters are women.

*90% of sexual abuse victims are abused by someone they know and trust.

-Amber alerts and the 'snatch and grab' are a fraction of sexual abuse occurrences. -if your 'security system' is simply the 'matching tag' for small children, it is not enough. -the 'matching tag' system is important, but is designed to protect children from the 10%. -the greater risk is from those we allow in classrooms – or from one with 'matching tag'!

*Sexual molesters will groom children AND gatekeepers prior to sexual behavior.

- staff members and volunteer leaders are <u>gatekeepers</u>

-staff members and volunteer leaders MUST understand and recognize grooming process

*There is NO visual profile for a molester.

-most molesters appear helpful, trustworthy, kind and safe
